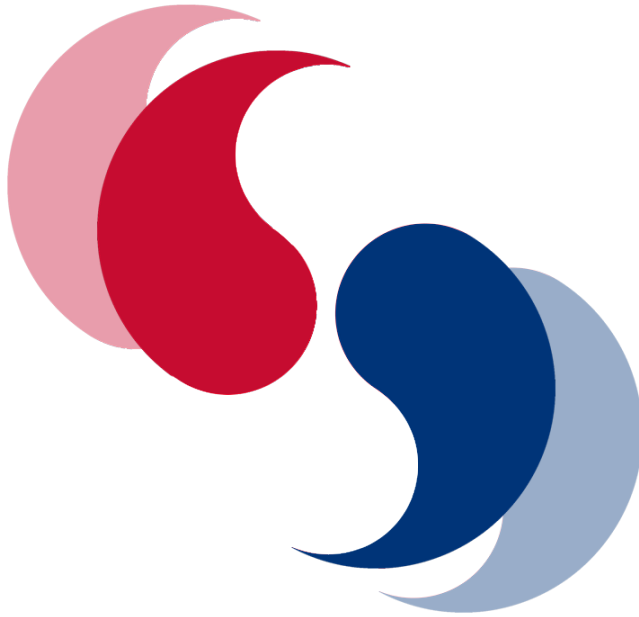

The venue for the tournament will be at Kintex, which is the largest convention center in Korea and also the host venue for both Seoul Open and the Inter-Korean Summit Press Center. Kintex is only 45 minutes away from Incheon International Airport and 20-40 minutes away from major tourist attractions in Seoul, such as Hongdae, Itaewon, and the Palaces. The tournament hotel will be at MVL Goyang, which is the only 5-star hotel in the Northern Greater Seoul Metropolitan Region; the hotel is 10 minutes walking distance to the tournament venue in Kintex. We have already partnered with Kintex and MVL Goyang for Seoul Open with outstanding previous feedback, and we are confident Korea WUDC 2021 will feature an enjoyable experience at these state-of-the-art facilities.

Our goal is to spread a culture of debate in Korea and to the entire world through this platform where people can freely exchange diverse ideas. We are blessed to have such an experienced and diverse Chief Adjudication Panel who will ensure that Korea WUDC will be top-notch in debate quality. We wish to create a unique and pleasurable cultural experience around exchange and friendship with the wide diversity of great food and culture that Korea uniquely offers. # What We Do



## Debate Korea Week

An annual event full of debate opportunities, workshops, and competitions of all academic levels, this week consists of **Seoul Open**, a BP format debate tournament for university-level students, and **Cornell-Yonsei Debate Invitational**, a domestic AP format debate tournament with a highly qualified international adjudication pool at the National Assembly.

## Sponsor and Host Tournaments

We host tournaments for debaters from all academic levels ranging from middle school, high school, and college. We also consult and assist tournament organization for domestic and international institutions in the greater Asian region.

### Solbridge Northeast Asian Open 2017

We sponsored in media coverage and live-streamed the annual championships hosted by Solbridge.

### KIDA National Championships 2016

We hosted the biannual Korean national collegiate debate championship at Yonsei University and Korean National Assembly.

### Hanoi BP Championship 2018

We sponsored the first large-scale international BP tournament ever to be hosted in Vietnam, with over 100 participants.





## Education and Training

We provide workshops, educational programs, and training sessions to teach young people from underprivileged youths to novice debaters to winners of International tournaments - argumentation, public speaking, and critical thinking skills.

### Debate Korea Winter Sessions

We provide a free and open biweekly lecture and training at Seoul National and Yonsei University, with over 200 cumulative participants.

### Welfare Center Debate Programs

We set up and volunteered in debate education programs to underprivileged elementary school kids in the Guro district, interacting with around 30 students.

### Co-op Library Debate Workshops

We collaborated with Yong-In Library to create after-school debate programs for local students, around 50-students.

## Spreading Debate Culture

Spreading the culture of debate can happen in any setting, from large academic conferences to podcasts. We have collaborated with institutions to bring fruitful discussion and meaningful change to the general public. We hope to expand our existing relationships with various institutions to bring a new era of debate education.

### Inter-Korean Summit

Debate Korea provided support in personnel management and media reportings at the inter-Korean Summit Press Center.

### National Pension Service Debate Podcast

We programmed a monthly debate podcast about welfare issues with the National Pension Service.

### MBN Y Forum Collaboration

We partnered with Intercom at the MBN Y Forum to engage 4000+ participants in discussions about Innovation.

# Seoul Open

Seoul Open is an international BP debate tournament hosted by Debate Korea and is the largest debate tournament in Korea. Seoul Open 2018, which also served as a dry run for Korea WUDC 2021 with the same debate venue and tournament hotel, was held at KINTEX (Korea International Exhibition Center), the largest convention center in South Korea, and MVL Hotel Goyang, a 5-star hotel only 10-minutes walking distance from the venue.

Past sponsors of Seoul Open have included AirAsia, Metropolitan Government of Seoul, Ministry of Education, National Assembly Committee on Foreign Affairs and Unification, National Pension Service, PLAN International, Redbull, and more. Seoul Open 2018's CAP featured Korea WUDC 2021 Chief Adjudicator Dan Lahav and Convenor Seokho Daniel Yoon as Co-CAs, as well as Cape Town 2019 DCA Steph White, WUDC ESL Finalist Kyungmi Lee, and ABP Champion Sajid Khandaker as DCAs. 100 teams from more than 20 different countries have joined to compete on this global stage with their shared passion for logic, pathos, and debate. Champions of Seoul Open 2018, Adnan Muttalib and Enting Lee, won a free trip to the Maldives featured by AirAsia. # Inter-Korean Summit



Debate Korea was at the Inter-Korean Summit 2018 as a part of the organizing team for the Official Main Press Center (MPC) in light of the recent wave of peace that has enlightened the Korean Peninsula. The MPC was established at Kintex, which is also the Korea WUDC 2021 venue, to host thousands of journalists and media personnel gathered in Korea to cover the summit. The MPC was nearly equivalent to a football stadium in size, at about 10,000 square meters, and had over 2,000 seats in the main briefing room with ample room for extensive interviews and briefings. 2,850 journalists from 460 news outlets from 41 countries have registered to the MPC to cover the summit. Every media briefing regarding the summit was provided with simultaneous interpretation in nine different languages, including English, Chinese, Spanish and Arabic. Debate Korea also had the unique opportunity to meet and interview Moon Chung-In, Special Adviser in Unification and Foreign Affairs to the South Korean President, during the summit and also received his congratulatory remarks for Seoul Open on site. We are proud to host Korea WUDC 2021 at such a meaningful venue at such a historic time.

## A Tournament Like No Other

This Tournament is the world's largest debating competition, and one of the largest annual international student events in the world. The inaugural Championship was hosted by the Glasgow University Union in January 1981, with 43 teams from 7 nations competing. Since then it has dramatically grown to an event that hosts over 400 teams (each comprised of two students), representing more than 380 universities from 80 different nations.



Students from the World's best universities regularly compete. Oxford, Cambridge, Harvard, Yale, Cornell, Stanford, Monash, Sydney and dozens of other world class institutions send their best students. As a result, being crowned 'World Champion' is one of the most prestigious titles a student can attain.



This is a unique opportunity for Korean students to interact with the international debating community, to engage in debates of issues of global importance, and to develop their communication and critical thinking skills.

# Korea WUDC



## Why Korea WUDC 2021?

Debate in Korea, and Northeast Asia at large, remains on the margins of the world debate stage. This is due to several reasons. First, debating remains an activity with a high entry barrier within Korea. This is due to the absence of institutions, personnel, and educational resources that cater to debaters' needs. A lack of public recognition, as well as a lack of financial sponsorship are also problematic. These domestic limitations were projected to the international debating stage. Only a handful of teams from Korea were able to attend WUDC in 2017; many passionate and talented debaters had to give up the opportunity to compete at the world stage annually.

Despite these difficulties, Korea persisted: Since Korea's first entry in the 1994 Melbourne WUDC, Korean teams have participated every year with one team from Yonsei University even proceeding to the elimination rounds in 2016. Public recognition and support for English debate have increased, and debate education has increasingly become systemized in the past few years.

The 2021 WUDC would appeal to a wide spectrum of Korean citizens. Hosting the 2021 WUDC in Korea will lower the bar of entry for the thousands of Korean students who are already excited for the possibility of Worlds in Korea. Moreover, the event will increase awareness for debate in the Korean public and encourage participation.

More importantly, Korea will be the leader of debate in the Northeast Asian region through this tournament. Until now, Asian debate performance at the global level has been focused in Southeast Asian countries such as Singapore, Malaysia, and the Philippines. For Korea, participants' results have often fallen short of our hopes – but this is not because Korean debaters lacked the skill. Rather, this is due to a lack of experience participating in international tournaments, and weak institutional support. Hosting the WUDC in Korea addresses all these problems because it opens opportunities for more international debate tournaments, more workshops, and institutional support.

As the first global-level debate tournament ever held in Northeast Asia, Korea WUDC 2021 conveys a lot of symbolic meaning: the tournament will solidify Korea's position as the pioneer of Northeast Asian debate among the international debate community. Debaters from all over the world will travel to Korea for tournaments. Many will want to visit Korea for the opportunities that Korea offers in debating. The exchange of information, culture, and human resources that are a direct result of WUDC would be an invaluable asset to Korea's future, and the future growth of debate for international debate as well as all of Northeast Asia.



# Korean Debate Circuit



The Korean debate scene provides a dynamic and encompassing circle for debaters, encouraging debaters of diverse age groups and regions to join and challenge their conventional beliefs through pushing themselves to their intellectual limits. Middle and high school students are encouraged to step into debate through tournaments such as Cornell-Yonsei and Korea Youth Debate Championship. University students not only participate in collegiate level tournaments but also assist in adjudicating and organising tournaments for younger students. More experienced debaters pave the way for future aspiring debaters through giving back to the community via non-profit organisations that educate students on speech and logic, providing lectures and insight on diverse issues to juniors through alumni nights and homecomings, and participating in open tournaments. We aim to strengthen this virtuous cycle and make debate not a one-time experience, but a process of striving for intellectual greatness and eloquence.

The South Korean debate circuit has been improving year by year. Ever since the establishment of Korea Intersvarsity Debate Association (KIDA) back in 2006, we have had biannual national championships along with countless institutional and open tournaments such as Seoul Open, KIDA Open, Korea Debate Open, CUDS Open, and more. Furthermore, South Korea is having a number of open tournaments that each society hosts during vacation period. All of such efforts have contributed into creating a vibrant domestic debate league. On top of this, the number of new debaters is constantly increasing, which is represented by enlarging size of novice tournament and rookie league in the Nationals. The Korean debate circuit aims to create an accommodating environment for debaters of all levels through creating specific leagues(EFL, Rookie, Novice) and to increase integration with the international debating circuit through encouraging participation and organisation of international tournaments.

# Chief Adjudication Panel



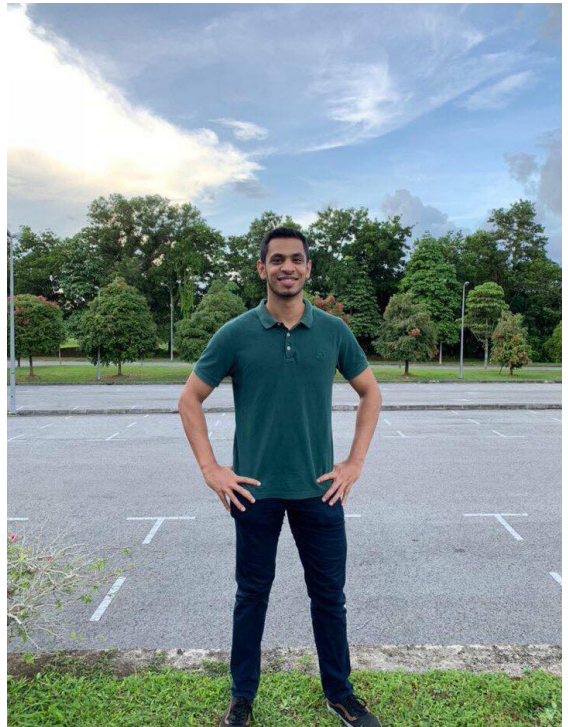
## **Chief Adjudicator: Dan Lahav (Tel Aviv)**

Dan Lahav is a WUDC Open Best Speaker, Open Semi Finalist, and a member of the top breaking team (Open & twice ESL). He is an EUDC ESL Champion, an Open Grand Finalist, 2nd ranked Open Speaker, twice the Best ESL Speaker and twice a member of the top breaking ESL team. Beyond Euros and Worlds, Dan has won over 20 tournaments including being the champion of the HWS Round Robin and the Cambridge IV, and has been the Best Speaker of over 20 competitions including the Oxford IV (Open & twice ESL) and the Cambridge IV (twice Open & thrice ESL).

Perhaps more importantly Dan has been a member of over 35 CA teams around the world including the Tallinn EUDC 2017, Hanoi Asian BP, HWS Round Robin, Cambridge IV, Oxford IV, China BP, Seoul Open, IIT Bombay IV, Red Sea Open, Paris Open, Budapest Open, Moscow Open, Hanoi ABP 2018 and many more. He will be serving as a DCA at Cape Town WUDC 2019, and as a Co-CA at Panama Pan Americans 2019 and at Athens EUDC 2019.

## Deputy Chief Adjudicator: Mubarrat Wassey (IIUM)

Mubarrat Wassey is a 3 time Open Octo-finalist at WUDC and the ESL Best Speaker in 2014. He is also an Australs Open Champion and Best ESL Speaker 2016, ABP 2016 Champion and two times best speaker, two times UADC Champion and Best Speaker 2016, Cambridge IV Open Champion and Best Speaker 2016, Oxford IV 6th Best open speaker and Best ESL Speaker, and Malaysian Nationals Best Speaker 2016. Mubarrat was also Co-CA of Hanoi Asian BP 2018, DCA of Bandung UADC 2018, Malaysian Nationals 2018, Malaysia Debate Open 2016, and will be serving as CA of Bali Australs 2019. He was also the 2nd Best Adjudicator at Krabi Asian BP 2017 and the Open Grand Finalist Adjudicator at Solbridge Australs 2015.



## Deputy Chief Adjudicator: Bobbi Leet (Stanford)

Bobbi Leet is an Open Finalist and 8th Best Speaker at Mexico WUDC 2018, and Open Finalist and Best Speaker at NAUDC 2017. She has reached the finals of the Yale IV three times (2015, 2016, 2017) and was twice top-three speaker. She has also excelled at the US University Debating Championships where she reached finals twice and was top ten speaker both times in 2017 and 2018. She is an HWS Round Robin 2018 Finalist and 4th speaker. She has her own share of Adjudication Core experience as she was the CA of Oxford IV 2018, Yale IV 2018, NAUDC 2018, and Oxford Women's 2018.

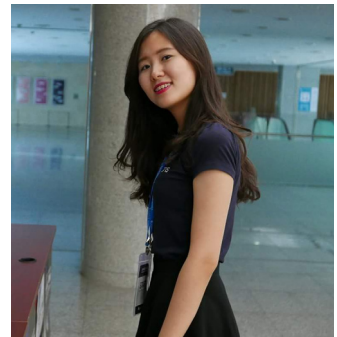

# Venue

## KINTEX

*Largest Convention Center in Korea only 30 minutes away from major tourist attractions*

KINTEX(Korea International Exhibition Centre) is the largest exhibition center in Gyeonggi Province, a region that embraces Seoul in its center. With very exclusive and luxurious interior, KINTEX will be the main venue for all nine days of the tournament. The Main Press Center of 2018 Inter-Korean Summit was hosted in the same building, with its state-of-the-art conference facilities and large accommodation capacity. There is free-wifi available at the venue. For dinner, we recommend going to the Hyundai Department Store KINTEX or Goyang Onemount; both are within a few minutes walking distance. We also recommend taking a stroll at Ilsan Lake Park, perhaps the perfect place to be for a quick getaway from the hard-core competition.



# Accommodation

## The MVL Hotel

*5-star hotel only 10 mins walking distance from the venue (from KINTEX)*

The MVL Hotel Goyang, is the largest five-star luxury hotel in the region. While Gyeonggi province is renowned for its attractions and various facilities to ensure comfortable tourism, The MVL Hotel, which is going to be the accommodating hotel for Korea WUDC 2021, is one of very few exclusive hotel that Gyeonggi can proudly offer. A myriad of landmarks and tourist attractions including Hyundai Dept. Store, Hallyu World Complex, and One Mount & Water Park are located within 10-minute walking distance for everyone to enjoy. Fully equipped with sauna and fitness facilities, along with a 24-hour business center (Facilities include copying, printing, FAX, laptop rentals and wireless internet.) it ensures a luxurious and relaxing stay.

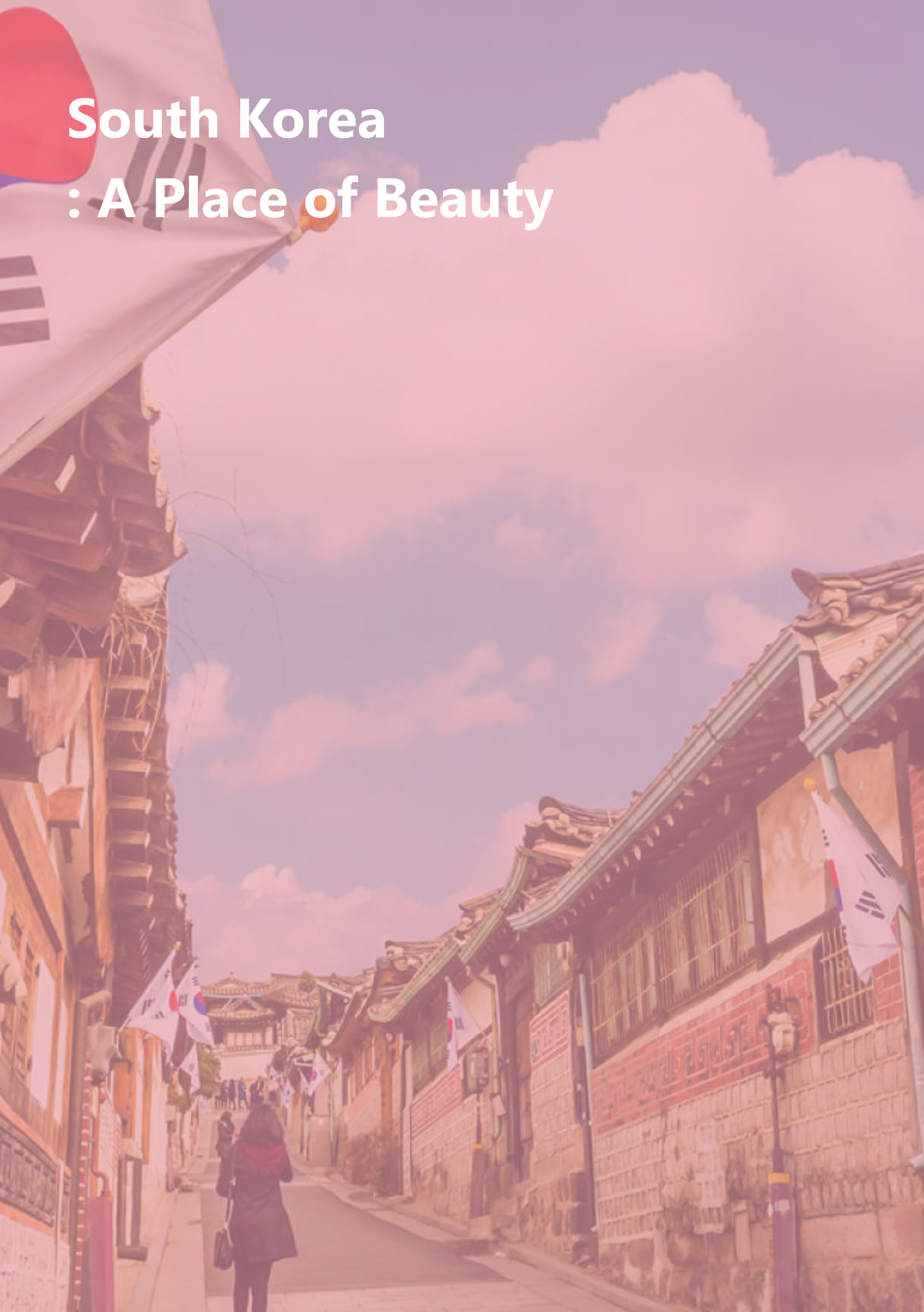

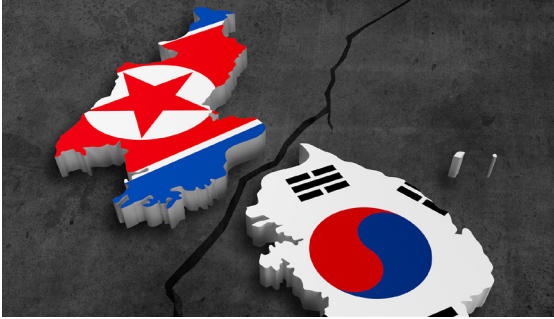

# A New Era of Peace



The Korean Peninsula has been the only divided nation after reunification of Germany in 1990. For long, news of constant nuclear threats and missile tests have provoked fear in the minds of people. However, there has been a recent change in atmosphere. Starting with the joint North and South Korean women's ice hockey team, potential peace between the Koreas has bloomed. President Moon Jae-In of South Korea was invited to visit North Korea by Kim Yo-Jung, the representative of North Korea during the 2018 Pyeongchang Winter Olympics. The invitation spurred preparation for the Inter-Korean Summit, after 11 years of antagonism. Under the slogan 'Peace, a New Start', the April 2018 inter-Korean summit took place in the Unification Pavilion in Panmunjom, Gyeonggi-Do. Two more summits followed in May and September. The results include the following:



- Alleviation of military tension by reducing military exercises
- Approach towards an official declaration of ending the Korean War
- Clearance of land mines at the Korea Demilitarized Zone
- Potential denuclearization of North Korea
- Invitation for Kim Jong Un to visit Seoul



Moreover, two North Korea-United States Summits took place in June and September of 2018. The Summits concluded with the possibility of ending the Korean War and Final, Fully Verified Denuclearization (FFVD) in North Korea. With these unprecedented events happening one after another, we are starting to see actual change in the Korean Peninsula; a change towards peace.

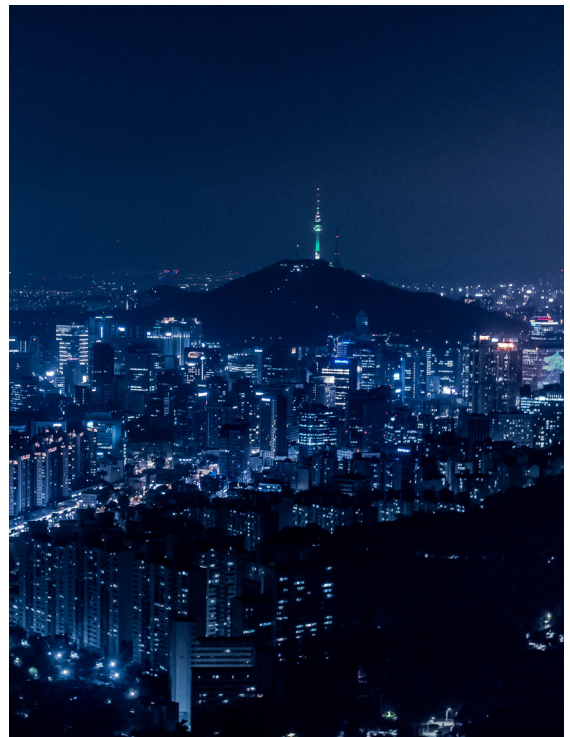




# Culture

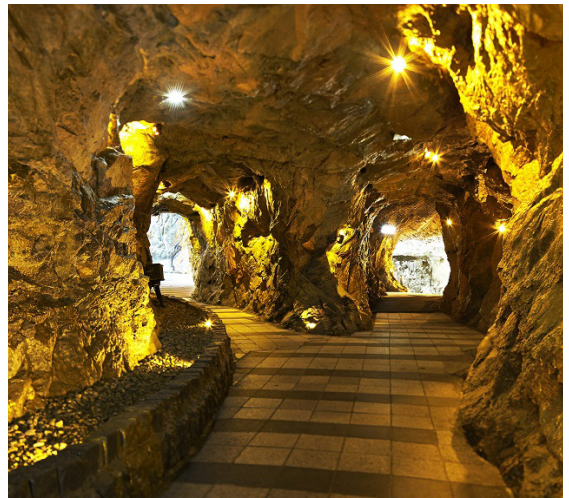


## Shopping - Goyang Starfield

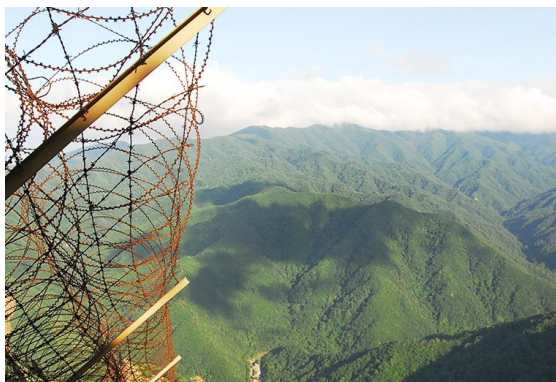
## Experience - Gwangmyeong Cave
